VOTING WITH A CRIMINAL RECORD

Your criminal record does NOT affect your right to vote in Minnesota unless you are <u>currently</u> serving a felony conviction sentence, including probation or parole.

✓OTING AFTER A FELONY CONVICTION

You can vote after you finish <u>all</u> parts of your sentence, including any probation, parole, or supervised release.

As soon as you finish (once you are 'off-paper'), you can vote. You will need to register to vote. It is best to register before Election Day, but it is not required. You cannot register to vote until your probation or parole is complete and you are officially discharged from supervision.

NOT SURE ABOUT YOUR LEGAL STATUS?
